A great year for GEMS Bike Belles (now on YouTube!)



'GEMS Bike Belles' is a girls bike club that was set up this year at Gosforth East Middle School. Made up of 12 girls from years 5 and 6, Miss Comb (school Bike It Champion) and Naomi (the school's Bike It Officer), the club's aim was to try and inspire, motivate and encourage more girls to get on their bikes.

The group met at lunchtimes 3 – 4 times a term to listen to pupils' ideas and issues around cycling and discuss how to tackle the barriers that stop girls from cycling. Some of the major barriers that were discussed included the lack of appropriate gear and clothing, the fear of 'standing out from the crowd' and the time and energy it can take to get the bike out. In these sessions the girls also designed and decorated their own club T-shirts, wrote poems and recorded their own video diaries.

In June the group went on a visit to another Bike It school - Morpeth Road Primary School, Blyth - to see how a school can be cycling mad for both boys and girls. As well as being treated to a scrummy breakfast and lunch the group also went on a bike ride with the school's cycling club. It was great day out for all involved and many thanks go to Morpeth Road Primary School for being very generous hosts! 

# How Sustrans is working with young people in your region

This summer over 40 schools across Tyne and Wear took part in their very own virtual Tour de France. Children and staff cycled daily into school to tally up their active journeys whilst also taking part in fun French and cycling activities in school.

Each school awarded four Vive le Vélo jerseys to lucky cyclists in their school. Four winning schools from Newcastle, Gateshead, North and South Tyneside came together for a French celebration day in July to receive their prize bikes at the Cycle Hub.

The overall winning school was Grange First School from Newcastle which had over 60% of their school cycling daily. Bravo tout le monde!

#### In the region

We have delivered 1372 activities in the Summer Term alone.

We have had 77,100 participants in the Summer Term enjoying the warm weather and lots of outside activities.

#### ...and across the UK

In 2013 we worked with over 2,100 schools throughout the UK, promoting cycling, walking and scooting to more than half a million pupils!

Feedback from teachers tells us that while we deliver fun activities, pupils have a real awareness of the benefits of active travel:

"They'll say to their parents, it's safer to come to school by bike or to walk, it's healthier, it's good for the environment – so those messages have really been sustained throughout the school."

Feedback from teachers also highlights the wider benefits of the project for pupils:

"Bike It is very much pupil led...", "Pupils have developed a sense of responsibility.", "They are more confident about their own abilities.", "Pupil independence has improved."

We have also extended our work in colleges and universities. Year-on-year the number of bikes parked at institutions we work with has risen, whilst 73% of students who loaned a bike from us said they cycled more since the project started. 75% said they would not have cycled without their loan bike.

#### St Catherine's Year 6 Bike Ride



The sun was well and truly out for this year 6 class's final days of primary school and what better way to spend the day than out on bikes exploring the local area? The group left the school gates to go on a bike ride around Jesmond Dene and Heaton Park. The ride was led by Naomi and Tom (School Champion Support Officer) from Sustrans and the school's head teacher. Mr. Ewing, also came along (always keen for a bike ride!). Highlights included a picnic lunch, learning the 'Leaf-fu' game and tucking into an ice cream from Sambuca's in Heaton Park. We wish this friendly group all the best for their future adventures at secondary school.

## **Hype that site – tinyurl.com/britaincycling**

Not the most thrilling URL, but this is the petition to ask Parliament to implement the recent **Get Britain Cycling** report (arising from a cross-party inquiry). It makes 18 key recommendations to increase cycling, including **high quality routes**, a default urban **20mph limit** and **£10 p/person to be invested** every year to increase cycling. It needs 100,000 signatures and currently has close to 70,000.

## **Tales of the Forgotten North**

This summer over 50 children from six schools in Newcastle and North Tyneside embarked on an epic journey from Ingram to Haltwhistle. This was not just a cycle ride; it was a journey in time and imagination. Children and adults alike heard ancient stories along the way from 'A Bit Crack' Storytellers.

These stories weaved and eddied like the very scenery we were cycling through. We heard stories whilst next to Bastilles, beside ancient wells, on top of standing stones and underneath ewe trees. The ride took us to incredible places such as Lady's Well, Ingram Valley and Elsdon to name a few. These places challenged and inspired all who took part.
